## Federal Aid Eligibility Requirements

### Federal Eligibility Requirements

Basic eligibility requirements that students must meet for Title IV aid,

- x demonstrate financial need for need-based federal student aid programs;
- x be a US citizen or an eligible noncitizen;
- x have a valid Social Security number (with the exception of students from the Republic of Marshall Islands, Federated States of Micronesia, or the Republic of Palau);
- x be enrolled or accepted for enrollment as a regular student in an eligible degree or certificate program;
- x maintain satisfactory academic progress in college;
- x provide consent and approval to have your federal tax information transferred directly to your 2024-2025 FAFSA, for students applying for 2024-2025;
- x sign the certification statement on the FAFSA form stating that you're not in default on a federal student loan, you do not owe money on a federal student grant, and you'll only use federal student aid for education purposes; and
- x show you're qualified to obtain a college or career school education by having a high school diploma, GED state approved homeschool setting with a completion credential for high school or another "ability-to-benefit" alternative. <a href="https://studentaid.gov/understand-aid/eligibility/requirements#ability-to-benefit">https://studentaid.gov/understand-aid/eligibility/requirements#ability-to-benefit</a>

# Restrictions on Eligibility

# Second Bachelor's Degree

Students are eligible for federal aid if they are pursuing double majors or dual degree programs as long as they meet Satisfactory Academic Progress requirements. If a student has earned an undergraduate degree and has re-enrolled in college to pursue another bachelor's degree, students are not eligible for pell grant.

#### Enrollment at More Than One Institution

Students who are enrolled at more than one college at the same time may only receive aid from one institution.
